



End Strength 1,030,500 (NDAA FY19)



Air National Guard 90 Wings






First military responders in the homeland




NORAD - Aerospace Control Alert

What is the State Partnership Program (SPP)?





➤ Joint Department of Defense (DoD) program managed by the National Guard, executed by the geographic combatant commands (CCMDs), and sourced by the National Guard of the partner States

➤ Links a State's National Guard with the partner nation's military/ security forces in a cooperative, mutually beneficial relationship

- Supports CCMD and Embassy security cooperation objectives
- Innovative, cost-effective, small footprint security cooperation program
- Cultivates enduring relationships that enhance influence and promote access
- Indirect training benefit for NG Title 32 and Title 10 missions
 - CBRNE, HADR, Aviation, Officer & NCO Training & Development, Medical, Engineering, Cyber Defense, Communications Capabilities
